CAMP ATTERBURY RESTRICTION OF MOVEMENT (ROM) EXPECTATIONS

Deployers: Individuals arriving on Thursday will spend Thursday night in the BOQ and will move to the ROM quarters on Friday evening as will all other deployers arriving on Friday.

- Thursday pickup: All Deployers who require CIF sizing or require weapons qualifications must arrive in time for pickup at the Indianapolis airport at 1300 Thursday (see schedule for more details).
- Friday pickup: All other deployers (who do NOT require CIF sizing or weapons qualifications) should plan to arrive in time for pickup at the Indianapolis airport at 1300 Friday.
- If flight options dictate that the person arrive the night before, the traveler should make arrangements to stay at a hotel near the Indianapolis airport and then shuttle to the airport for pickup the following day at 1300.

Re-Deployers: Individuals arriving to Indy via the Bliss/Atterbury rotator will arrive Sunday and be directly transported to Camp Atterbury for ROM for 14 days.

Living Quarters

- The ROM camp in general is co-ed, but has separate Male and Female living quarters.
- The ROM living quarters are open barracks with 40 beds broken down into four separate living spaces (10 per section, spaced 8 feet apart, with personal space created by wall lockers).
- Each deployer has independent sleeping arrangements (bottom bunk bed),
- Two sets of bed linens will be provided; civilians can bring their own linens. Personal linens and pillows may be brought.
- Laundry pickup service will be provided at least once a week and may be dropped off at a designated central location.
- Latrines and showers are available inside the Male and Female living quarters. All are designed to provide private/individual time.

Dining Options

- All meals are provided and delivered to the ROM common area. This includes a hot meal for breakfast, hot meal for lunch on most days and box lunch sandwiches when required based on schedule, and a hot meal for dinner.
- **Any food allergies must be made known to the RSOI teams prior to arrival to Camp Atterbury.**
- Personal preference (rather than allergy) on food cannot be accommodated; however, there are always 2 options available for each meal. One that is pasta or non-pork meat and another than may include pork.
- Food order and delivery (at personal expense) from the local economy is also available during specified times.
- There is a separate dining area that allows for sitting down (i.e., meals will not be consumed in the living quarters).
- Items requested from the Post Exchange can be ordered via order forms located in each ROM area. The ROM support staff will retrieve and deliver ordered items during specified days and times (**no tobacco or alcohol items**).

Common Area

- All facilities are climate controlled (AC in summer and heat in winter).
- The ROM Common Area (Admin, Support, Dining) consists of a Common Day Room/Dining Room which has a large screen TV, access to a Computer Lab with WIFI, and a MWR exercise

room with limited exercise equipment (treadmills and stationary bicycles) and reading material, games, outdoor activities.

- There is ample time in the schedule for civilians to move about freely in the outside/open air, within a fenced in ROM area.

Deployment Training

- Civilians who need to complete mobilization screening and training will participate in training and medical activities during the 14-day ROM period. Movement to other buildings is accomplished in a protected manner and strictly controlled to protect the integrity of the ROM. The training building is adjacent to the ROM area, is also fenced in. Individuals are escorted to the training building for scheduled classes or to complete administrative tasks. Instructors and admin staff enter the training building through a separate entrance and remain located behind plexiglass to avoid contact with deployers.
- The deployment activities are generally conducted during the morning, with open time in the afternoons.

ROM Only Participants

- Some civilians who are part of the pre-deployment group are in the ROM solely to complete the mandatory 14-day ROM prior to OCONUS travel. This includes individuals on PCS assignments to Kuwait, Qatar, or similar countries and short-term TDY travelers who do not need mobilization screening. These individuals will be invited to any "all hands" meetings or briefings conducted in the training building, but are generally not required to attend other deployment training.

Re-Deployment Activities

- All movement of re-deployers exiting and entering the RoM area will be strictly monitored and controlled by the RoM support staff.
- Re-deployers will need to complete all post deployment health assessments on-line and via telemedicine from the ROM with the medical clinic.
- Redeployers may also utilize their time in the ROM to finalize any travel arrangements to return to home station.
- Beginning in October (when a second secured building is available) re-deployers will have some optional training and briefings that they will be invited to attend.
- Because of ROM restrictions, the ability to create new CONUS CACs is very limited. Re-deployers are encouraged to have this completed after they arrive at home station.
